

Working to preserve, enhance and advocate for Denver's parks, recreation resources, open space and urban tree canopy for 47 years.

Have you seen the 'Be A Smart Ash' or 'This Ash is Covered' tree ribbon around town? If so, you're seeing the front lines of an effort to combat what experts are calling the most significant threat to urban forests in North American history and 'A natural disaster in slow motion.'

Be A Smart Ash!

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) threatens to kill 15% of our city's trees - some 330,000 ash trees that line our streets and shade our yards. That's an annual value loss of \$18.3 million in environmental benefits provided by trees, including cleaner air and water, absorption and storage of greenhouse gases, flood control, enhanced property value, wildlife habitat, energy conservation, cooling of the urban heat island, and a host of physical, psychological, and social benefits.

EAB has killed 50 million trees in 28 states in the East and Midwest, costing communities billions of dollars in tree treatment, removal, and replacement.

The tiny green beetle was first discovered in Boulder in 2013, where its spread is extensive. It was detected in Longmont in June this year, and, while it has not yet been discovered in Denver, many experts believe it is likely already here.

EAB presents a serious and daunting challenge. But we have hope – and a strong plan. The City Forester's Emerald Ash Borer Response Plan incorporates lessons learned from communities throughout the East and Midwest. Denver is taking a strong, proactive leadership role on this issue, and communities across the country are watching with great interest. The City has begun treating select large and healthy right-of-way ash trees that can still benefit our communities for decades to come. They are removing small and unhealthy ash trees that should be replaced rather than treated, and in May they launched Be A Smart Ash, a fun, largescale awareness campaign to educate the public.

One of the most important components of the plan is the proactive planting of new trees to reduce the impact of the eventual loss of 330,000 ash across Denver. The City is partnering with The Park People to mobilize hundreds of volunteers, residents, and community groups to raise awareness and get new trees planted throughout our community.

Through our Denver Digs Trees and Community Forester programs, The Park People will mobilize a largescale spring distribution

#### **EAB FAST FACTS:**

- Non-native wood-boring beetle from Asia spread by the movement of infested ash trees and wood, e.g. firewood, packing material
- EAB adults lay eggs on ash trees. Larvae tunnel underneath bark, feeding on water-conducting tissues, slowly killing the tree
- Kills weak and healthy trees, young and mature. and all major North American ash species, including all White and Green Ash varieties
- · Kills trees within five years unless treated with

## THE FINAL HOURS to Save Our Sundial

For the past two and a half years, The Park People has been working with residents dedicated to raising the funds needed to save the beloved Sundial & Plaza at Cranmer Park. After careful analysis of the site with the help of historic preservation specialists and design experts, we elected to pursue a renovation and reconstruction project that will resolve the plaza's structural deficiencies and drainage problems to create a more sustainable site for future generations.

We have made great progress in raising the \$1.8 million needed for the project. Since our last report in The Park Bench, support from foundations, businesses, and individuals has helped move the campaign forward. In a demonstration of continued City support, the Department of Arts and Venues increased their project support by \$25,000 to meet the anticipated actual costs of the mountain view panorama re-creation, and the Department of Parks and Recreation included an additional \$300,000 of funding in their proposed 2017 budget. These additional funds bring the City's contribution to over half of the anticipated construction costs. In May, the Stapleton Family through the Harmes C. Fishback Trust offered a \$50,000 challenge in conjunction with our July Independence Day Family Fun Festival. We are so grateful to these partners and to the many individuals and foundations who committed new and additional funds to leverage these powerful matching dollars. We are so pleased to have partnerships with others in our community who value this special site and appreciate the vital role that Denver's parks, shared spaces, and special places play in all our lives. We feel confident that with the support of the community in the Final Hours of the campaign, we can reach our goal by year's end and complete the project in 2017.

### **SUNDIAL & PLAZA QUICK FACTS:**

- Cranmer Park's 6-foot quartzite Sundial is one of Denver's unique and beloved park landmarks.
- Built in the 1930s, the plaza is a visual gateway to the mountains. Its beautiful but severely damaged mosaic panorama depicts the Front Range peaks, including five 14ers.
- The site has a rich history tied to George E. Cranmer and Mayor Ben Stapleton, key visionaries behind much of Denver's parks system, including Red Rocks Amphitheatre and Winter Park.
- More than 70,000 metro area residents and tourists from around the world visit Cranmer Park each year.
- The site is listed as one of the state's Most Endangered Places. The plaza was built without a solid foundation, which has led to extensive buckling, sagging, and cracking over the decades.
- The sundial, plaza, and colorful mosaic mountain panorama are in dire need of a full-scale renovation and reconstruction to resolve the foundation and drainage problems that threaten the future of this iconic park landmark.



## **Tennis for Kids**

For more than 30 years, the Gates Tennis Center has been the finest public tennis facility in Colorado and consistently recognized as one of the best in the nation. It has been the recipient of the Starburst Community Award, USTA Outstanding Large Public Facility, and most recently Tennis Industry's Municipal Tennis Facility of the Year. The late Charles C. Gates gifted the Center to the citizens of Denver in hopes of providing the highest quality facility for people of all ages, abilities and backgrounds. Wanting to ensure its long-term sustainability, Mr. Gates expressed a desire that the Center be managed by The Park People in partnership with City of Denver. In 2006, The Park People retained Colorado Tennis Management to manage the facility, and the Tennis For Kids Outreach Program was formally created.

Tennis for Kids is a nonprofit, 501(c)3 program at Gates Tennis Center supporting Colorado's youth. The program offers a sliding scale scholarship funded by donations from our local community. The purpose of our program is to provide financial assistance to enable motivated juniors ages 18 and under to learn and

play the sport of tennis. Through tennis, fundamental life skills such determination, a strong work ethic, responsibility, integrity, commitment, physical fitness and self-confidence can be learned. Tennis for Kids is celebrating its 10th year and has served over 500 kids during that time; approximately 50 kids annually. This is a number we can grow; our reach has only been limited by our budget. The positive impact Tennis for Kids is having on young people the past 10 years has been possible because of donations from a small pool of individuals and tournaments like the Colorado State Open. However, changes in the structure of the Colorado State Open may impact Tennis for Kids, requiring funds to be raised from the tennis community including individuals, local businesses, foundations, and events. Donations to 'Tennis for Kids' are gratefully accepted care of The Park People.

Gates Tennis Center is open year round. Colorado is one of the sunniest states and people are playing outdoors most of the year! The Center offers programs from Pee Wee (ages 4-8), juniors (8-18) to adult lessons, ladders, socials and tournaments. Come out to Gates for fun tennis and great exercise!


## Denver Digs 1,340 New Trees in a Snow Storm!

Despite a cold, wet snow storm, our amazing volunteers rallied to distribute 1,340 affordable and free trees to Denver residents through our spring *Denver Digs Trees* distribution. We were inspired by the heart-warming sight of 600+ households coming to claim their trees in the snow. Volunteers delivered and planted 170 trees for 120 residents, ensuring those with physical limitations could participate. More than 750 trees were planted in Denver neighborhoods most in need of trees and with low- to moderate- average incomes, and 230 trees were provided to applicants facing financial hardship. These trees will grow to cool and beautify our neighborhoods, filter air pollution, provide habitat for wildlife, improve property values, make our streets more walkable and create healthier, more vibrant communities.



### Each year these 1,340 trees will...

- provide \$6,000 in energy savings
- offset 225,500 lbs of CO2
- reduce 1,660 lbs of air pollution
- manage 1,337,000 gal of storm water
- provide \$35,000 in total net benefits

### LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends, Fall 2016

As we are reminded on a daily basis, our community is growing rapidly. Heavy traffic, cranes erecting multiplexes across the city, the soaring housing prices – these are the common topics of conversation if you live in Denver. And who can blame anyone for wanting to move here? It is the best. But the impacts of this growth cannot be ignored. Denver proper is anticipated to grow by 12% by 2025 – that's another 80,000 people in only 9 years. The seven-county metro area will grow by more than 1 million by 2040, increasing pressure on the urban core.

In the face of such growth, our parks and other green infrastructure will play an even more critical role in balancing the strains of the built environment and supporting the vibrancy of our communities. Even and especially as we face Emerald Ash Borer, we need a full and healthy forest canopy to cool our neighborhoods and mitigate the urban heat island effect, to reduce flooding as impermeable surfaces expand, and to filter pollutants from our air as traffic congestion worsens. We need urban oases where we can rest, relax, find inspiration, and re-create ourselves; where we can connect with nature and run uninhibited on occasion; where we can escape, exercise, and gather with others. As our city grows, we need those common spaces where people from different backgrounds and perspectives can share a space and interact or simply co-exist; spaces where strangers become more familiar and where community becomes possible.

As The Park People embarks on a year of strategic planning and the City of Denver begins a community-driven process to update the parks and recreation master plan and other citywide goals for the future (<u>Denveright</u>), I ask for your support.
